

TODAY IS THE DAY YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE

In 2014, former Executive Director of the Cobb Community Foundation, Mayor Tommy Allegood worked closely with the Cobb County Board of Commissioners to create a mechanism for encouraging the creation of new programs and expansions of existing

ones where a relatively small investment could make a significant impact. Between 2015 and 2017, the County made available **\$820,000** for the Cobb Community Impact Grants. Private and corporate donors provided **\$936,795** in matching dollars, and nearly **325,000 Cobb residents** were impacted in some form or another.

Beginning in 2019, Cobb Community Impact Grants will be funded with contributions directly from the community. Businesses, families and individuals are coming together to ensure that Cobb Community Impact Grants will continue to be available, both now and into the future.

INVESTMENT AND GIVING OPPORTUNITIES

While contributions to the **Cobb Community Impact Fund** can be made in any amount and at any time at **CobbFoundation.org**, Cobb Community Foundation is seeking five-year commitments to fund both current grants and future grants.

FUND A COBB COMMUNITY IMPACT GRANT

You have the opportunity to fund a \$5,000, \$7,500 or \$10,000 Cobb Community Impact Grant and know that your investment will be made in an organization and program that has been vetted through Cobb Community Foundation's competitive grant process.

- Only 501(c)(3) organizations providing services in Cobb County and organizations outside of Cobb that are providing services primarily to Cobb County residents are eligible to apply for the grant.
- The competitive grant process administered by Cobb Community Foundation ensures grant recipients are compliant with all regulatory filing requirements.
- In addition to detailed information regarding the program for which the grant is being requested, applicants must also provide financial statements, board information, actual and project matching fund numbers as well as at least one example of collaboration with other non-profits.
- Grant recipients will submit a report detailing the use of funds and the grant's impact.

FUNDING OPTIONS

Five-year grants may be funded annually or via a one-time contribution. Annual investments may be accelerated at any time.
